Introduction

At a time of great uncertainty internationally, and particularly for the OSCE area, it is an honour to serve the OSCE Parliamentary Assembly which continues to contribute to security across our region. **Through high-level political dialogue, targeted bilateral engagement, and leadership of election observation, OSCE parliamentarians can be proud of the work they conduct through this Assembly.**

Within the Secretariat, we feel privileged to support the many different fields of work that parliamentarians undertake through the OSCE PA. We are witness to the heartfelt thanks and appreciation that refugees and IDPs express when OSCE parliamentarians they meet reassure that their difficulties are not forgotten. We are witness to the difficult conversations when OSCE parliamentarians confront government leaders that are responsible for democratic backsliding and repression. We are witness to the growing understanding and trust that develop between parliamentarians from formerly hostile countries. This front-row seat the Secretariat enjoys to the impactful work parliamentarians do through the OSCE PA is a galvanizing force for our supporting efforts.

From this privileged perspective on Assembly activities, I also see the work and commitment from so many parliaments and parliamentarians. I want to particularly **thank the Delegation of the Netherlands led by Farah Karimi for the impeccable preparations they have put in place for hosting our meeting in the Hague.** Similarly, my heartfelt thanks to **Selami Altinok and the Turkish parliament** for its incredible hospitality displayed for our Autumn Meeting in historic Istanbul and to **Paola Cardoso and the Portuguese parliament** for our remarkable 2025 session in Porto.

This front-row seat the Secretariat enjoys to the impactful work parliamentarians do through the OSCE PA is a galvanizing force for our supporting efforts.

Together with the Danish parliament and Austrian government that host our offices, they have offered discreet but major contributions to the Assembly's continued success this past year.

Contributions to regional security

The vast amount of activities undertaken by OSCE parliamentarians and supported by the Secretariat in the past year cannot be fully reported on here, however a condensed list is annexed to this report. Even in just the past three months since our Winter Meeting, however, the Assembly has displayed impressive leadership at the political level and activity on the ground.

President Pere Joan Pons has continued to ensure that the Assembly's voice is represented in high-level diplomatic engagement related to supporting Ukraine. In engagement in Kyiv, Bucha and Brussels, the President has taken numerous opportunities to convey OSCE PA policies of support in high-level meetings, including with **President Volodymyr Zelenskyy and EU foreign ministers.** The President has worked closely with Special Envoy on Russian Abductions and Deportations of Ukrainian Children **Carina Ödebrink (Sweden), whose contribution has elevated the Assembly's efforts in this field** including through engagements in Berlin, Brussels, and New York. I'm pleased that the Secretariat has been able to contribute to all of this work with responsive and timely advice and support. I also feel that **Mykyta Poturaiev and Artur Gerasymov** deserve particular recognition for supporting our efforts in Ukraine, and contributing to the OSCE PA's work as Bureau Members while still living and working in a war zone.

President Pons has also remained active in leading Assembly engagement in Central Asia and the South Caucasus, heading delegation visits to Kazakhstan and Georgia in recent months. Together with **Azay Guliyev (Azerbaijan), Special Representative on Central Asia Angelos Syrigos (Greece), and Special Representative on Climate Change Ainur Argynbekova (Kazakhstan),** the President participated in the Regional Ecological Summit in Astana, leading discussions on parliamentary

diplomacy for climate action and sustainable development, and holding a series of high-level meetings including with **Kazakh President Kassym Jomart-Tokayev**. In Georgia, the President was accompanied by **Vice-President Luis Graca (Portugal), Special Representative for the region, and Jevrosima Pejovic (Montenegro) and Christine Blower (United Kingdom)**, for a wide range of meetings with political leaders, opposition representatives and civil society. They reiterated strong support for Georgia's sovereignty and territorial integrity, expressed concern regarding the lack of political dialogue in the country and encouraged further democratic developments.

The President has also particularly prioritized Assembly work related to gender equality, participating in the IPU's Conference of Women Parliamentarians in Belgrade, as well as numerous online events.

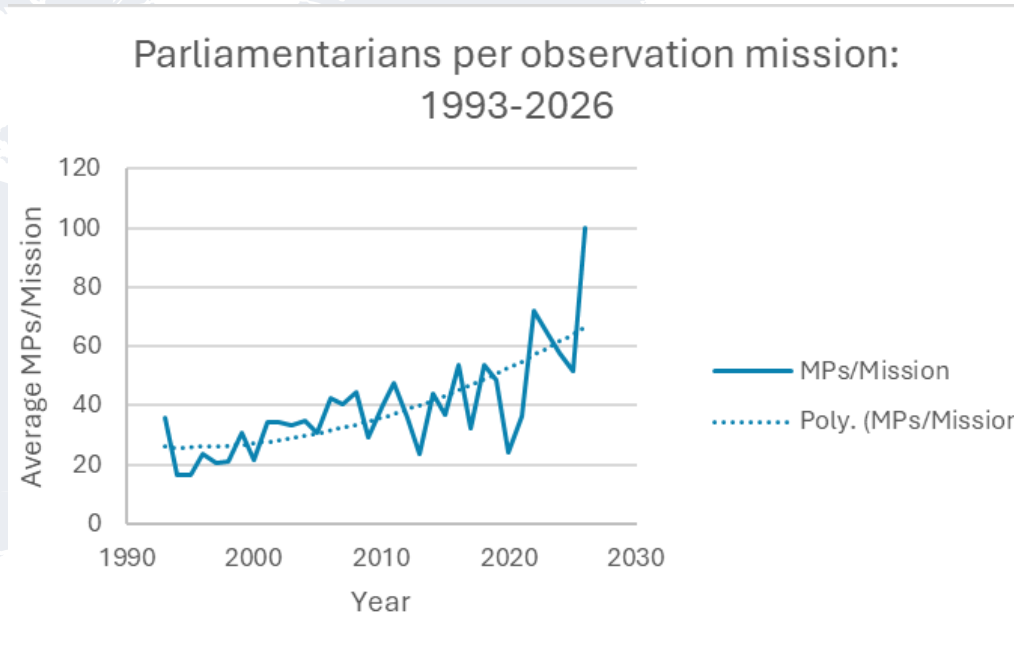
The forward-looking approach that our Assembly brings to our work is perhaps most evident in the many events related to youth engagement that Members participate in. **Special Representative on Youth Engagement Lucija Tacer Perlin (Slovenia)** has continued to be an active advocate for **youth political engagement** across the region, participating in various outreach events and running a series of seminars on Youth, Peace and Security topics. More and more, events in various fields are taking on a youth perspective. **Vice-President Gudrun Kugler (Austria)**, as Special Representative on Demographic Change and Security, took the opportunity to discuss Demographic Change and Youth Political Participation as part of an ODIHR-organized event. First Committee **Vice-Chair Jevrosima Pejovic** similarly discussed evidence-based research in addressing global challenges such as geopolitical tensions, AI governance, and disinformation at an OSCE-organized event on future generations with young researchers. I'm also particularly pleased that the **ad hoc Committee on Countering Terrorism's focus on youth radicalization** is continuing following the recent 'School Dialogues' in Montenegro. **Chair Kamil Aydin's stewardship** of this process that brings together educators, policymakers, and law enforcement is a demonstration of the OSCE PA's ability to add real value in a constructive manner.

The Assembly's Special Representatives have continued to contribute to regional security through their targeted outreach in a range of fields. **Mark Pritchard (United Kingdom) has remained active in addressing the Arctic and High North**, including through a range of meetings with officials and experts in Copenhagen. **Special Representative Federica Onori (Italy) has continued to advance the Assembly's work on artificial intelligence**, promoting dialogue on its implications across all three dimensions of security while helping to develop parliamentary engagement on AI-related issues. Former Vice-President **Kyriakos Hadjiyianni (Cyprus)**, as Special Representative on South East Europe, continued efforts to strengthen regional dialogue, gathering twenty parliamentarians in Ohrid for a forum on Cybersecurity, and supporting democratic governance including through his on-the-ground activity in Moldova, as well as several online engagements; his efforts to create the **Inter-Parliamentary Forum of the South-East Europe OSCE PA Delegations** will remain a lasting legacy for the Assembly.

I also want to thank **Vice-President Eugenio Zoffili and the Italian parliament for organizing an impressive conference focused on combating drug trafficking and organized crime**, in Rome. The conference brought together more than 150 parliamentarians – almost half of the OSCE PA's membership for targeted high-level discussions on the security threats posed by organized crime which was accompanied by **an audience with His Holiness Pope Leo XIV**. The continued interest of national parliaments to host stand-alone conferences associated with the OSCE PA, such as the one in Rome, is a testament to the health and vibrancy of the Assembly as a forum for dialogue.

Engagement through our election observation work has again set remarkable new heights, with more than 200 parliamentarians lending their time and expertise during our two most recent missions in Armenia and Hungary. This represents some two-thirds of the OSCE PA's overall membership – an incredible sign of interest and support for the OSCE's work in this field. The leadership demonstrated by **Farah Karimi and Jevrosima Pejovic in Armenia and Sargis Khandanyan (Armenia) and Rupa Huq (United Kingdom) in Hungary** has again demonstrated our Assembly's particular strength in this critically important

field. **The continuously increasing parliamentary participation in our election observation activities is a clear sign of support from national parliaments in our work.** It is our strong hope that peace will soon be achieved in Ukraine, and that regular electoral processes can be resumed; our Membership must be ready to contribute **through election observation in Ukraine** when this happens, and I hope that the Assembly will support efforts to make provisions for this eventuality.

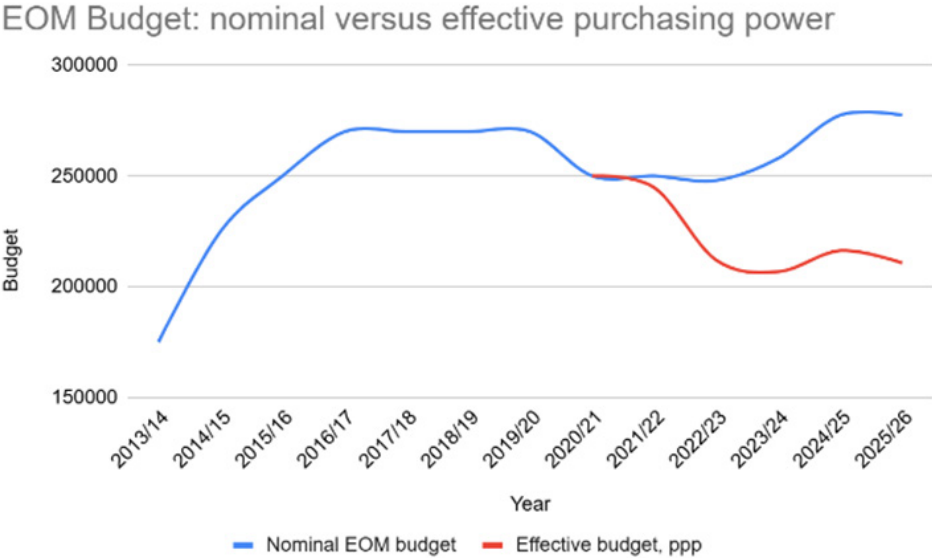
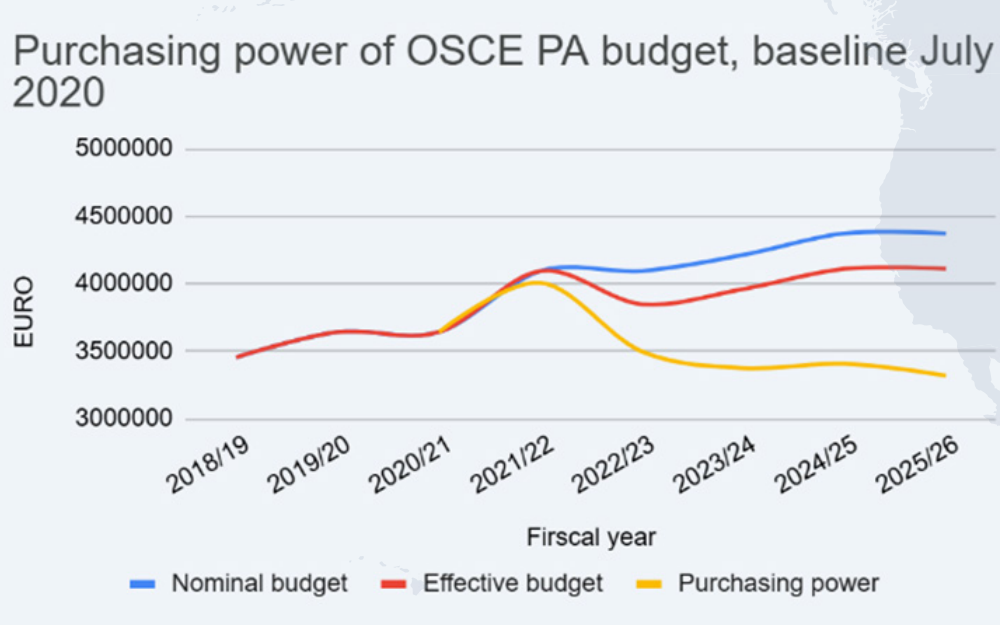


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Financial Matters

The exceptionally high interest in the Assembly is evident in the increasing engagement with heads of state and senior ministers as well as the increasing number of parliamentarians participating in each of our activities. **This remarkable success has nonetheless contributed to our financial difficulties, putting strain on our already stretched resources.** I am proud of our ability to deliver so much in terms of impact, on a budget of less than 4.5 million Euro.

Since 2022, our already small budget has been further reduced in practice through the double impact of: 1) non-contribution by the Russian Federation, and 2) significant inflation. The missing six percent from the Russian Federation would be a problem under normal circumstances, but with the additional cumulative inflation of some 24 percent since July 2020, **the purchasing power of our budget is less than what was adopted by the Assembly in 2018.** In the field of election observation, the picture is even more challenging: our budget is effectively less than what we had twelve years ago in 2014. Despite strict expenditure control, we have had to make some use of the Assembly’s financial reserves in recent years to cover both the income shortfall caused by inflation, the non-payment of Russian Federation contributions and the rising costs of additional activities mandated by its Members and political leadership.



Noting the financial realities that are hampering our work, a number of delegations have voluntarily committed extra-budgetary support to our work. **Luxembourg Parliament’s significant extra-budgetary support** has enabled enhanced engagement in South East and Eastern Europe. I thank them as well as **Switzerland and Norway** for their additional extra-budgetary support, and **Estonia, Iceland, Latvia, Liechtenstein, Lithuania and San Marino for voluntarily increasing their contributions to the EUR 10,000 level**, as well as **Montenegro’s** commitment to additional funding for the School Dialogues initiative. The **Danish parliament** continues to be – in practical terms as our host – the largest single contributor to the OSCE PA’s resources, and I reiterate our thanks for their continued support. Similarly, the **Austrian government’s** support to our Vienna Office, as well as to **Germany and Italy’s** support through secondments are all major contributions to our collective work.

The increasing interest of parliaments and governments to support OSCE PA work through extra-budgetary contributions is a strong sign of our Assembly's overall health. Between hosting meetings, seconding personnel, and providing extra-budgetary contributions this year, **17 parliaments - 30 percent - have independently decided that OSCE PA work provides sufficient value for money that they should augment their contributions** to our collective work. We can all be proud of this show of confidence. I continue to encourage all parliaments to examine their ability to contribute more to the Assembly's collective work, either through extra-budgetary contributions, hosting Assembly meetings, or other means.

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Interest in holding OSCE PA events is clearly not diminishing. I want to warmly thank the **Parliament of Andorra, which will host our Autumn Meeting this year**; for a small country, hosting a major OSCE PA meeting is an even more significant undertaking, which Andorra will now be doing for the third time. We also have invitations to host our major events in the **United States, in Serbia, in Albania, and in Belgium** in the coming years. This is all very reassuring. Nonetheless, the OSCE governmental side's financial challenges will also have an impact on our work. In particular, the downsizing of **the OSCE's presence in the Hofburg will mean that the OSCE PA's Winter Meeting will require changes**. Use of the Hofburg facilities are being explored in close coordination with OSCE counterparts in Vienna, but availability and costs remain subject to ongoing negotiations. Maintaining a Winter Meeting format similar to previous years would likely require substantial additional financing. Together with the OSCE Conference Services and Austrian authorities, the Secretariat is examining options for the Winter Meeting, and we will report back as further information is available.

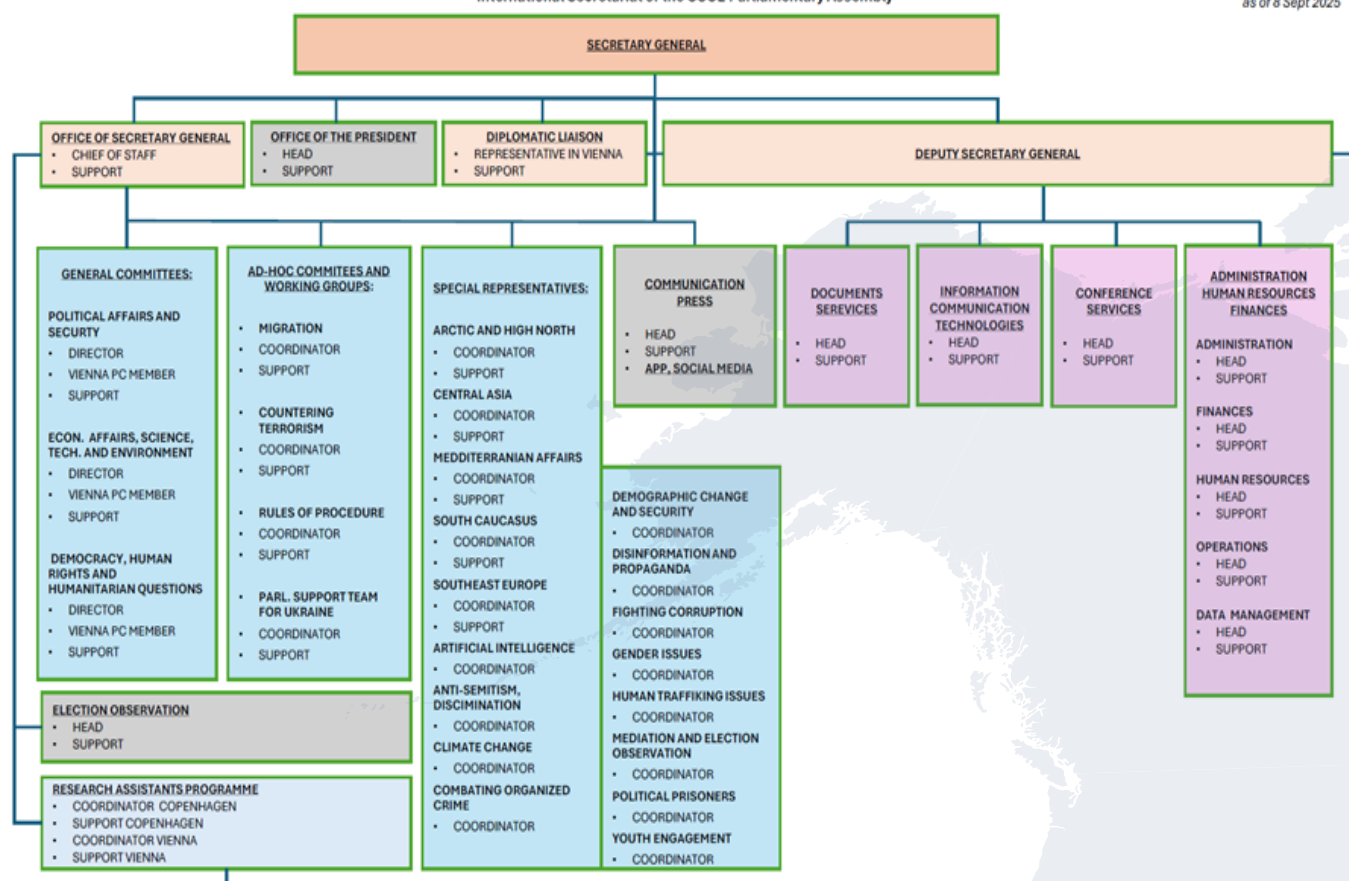

The breadth of support for OSCE PA work described above is impressive, but more is needed to ensure financial security. It is my hope that the Standing Committee will take steps to rectify the overall financial shortfall that the Assembly has been experiencing in recent years caused by missing contributions and inflation. The overwhelming interest by parliamentarians to engage in OSCE PA work must be met with resources to match.

Administrative Matters

In an Assembly as dynamic as ours, with constant new initiatives and developing priorities, flexibility and adaptability is the only option for the Secretariat. While the Organigram of the International Secretariat currently identifies some 70 distinct functions, these are all fulfilled by two elected leaders and 23 professional staff working for the Secretariat who each fulfil multiple functions and support parliamentarians working in various fields. I'm **proud of the support that this small group of 25 people** provide to the President, the Bureau, numerous General and ad hoc Committees, and a range of Special Representatives, all at very low cost.



Mirroring the Assembly's own approach of prioritizing flexibility, the Secretariat has always kept a light bureaucratic and regulatory approach in order to stay responsive to the demands of the Assembly. This flexible and lean administrative structure is complemented with the application of new technological solutions and modern working methods. A recent example is the implementation of a new electronic performance appraisal system which has streamlined processes, strengthened documentation and reporting, and improved the efficiency of internal management processes. Also, following a collaborative review process that incorporated both management and staff perspectives, we recently amended our Staff Regulations and Staff Rules, clarifying certain administrative and disciplinary measures and reflecting our commitment to maintaining a constructive and well-governed workplace in line with evolving best practices. The Secretariat is composed of two officials elected by the Standing Committee – both men – and otherwise women currently represent **52 percent** of the Secretariat and men **48**; we have also recently agreed on a Gender Equality Action Plan for the Secretariat, that will strengthen our processes and produce measurable results and data in the coming three years.

While the Organigram of the International Secretariat currently identifies some 70 distinct functions, these are all fulfilled by 25 professionals working for the Secretariat who each fulfil multiple functions and support parliamentarians working in various fields.

Oversight

As the Secretariat to a body of parliamentarians who all have budgetary and oversight responsibilities in your own parliaments, we are very aware of the importance of careful oversight of the administration's work.

It is a source of pride that **the Secretariat has consistently – for more than 30 years – received positive audit reports** from the independent auditors selected by the Standing Committee.¹ However, I believe that it is not sufficient to only have proof that there is no wrongdoing: parliamentarians should have confidence that the Secretariat delivers value for money and overall delivers best practices. It was with this in mind that I encouraged – in 2023 – the expansion of our audit to include a business performance audit. Since that time **Deloitte has scrutinized numerous of our work practices** including employment contract changes, recruitment and termination procedures, employee benefits, salary comparative analysis with other similar organizations (such as the OSCE, UN, NATO PA, IPU and the Council of Europe), cost approval, ICT equipment replacement and decommissioning, staff selection processes for statutory meetings, performance appraisal procedures, and the implementation of a new expense management system. I am pleased that these rigorous exercises from the **Deloitte team have consistently confirmed the sound management of our Secretariat.**

The Assembly's strengthened audit framework has provided valuable assurance and has contributed to our continual efforts to strengthen financial governance, internal controls and administrative procedures. It should be noted that the cost of the audit has increased significantly since

the introduction of the integrated financial and business performance audit. On an indicative annualized basis, it is around 3.5 times higher than the average annual audit cost under the previous audit arrangement. Given the conclusions from the reviews already conducted over the past three years, and the increasingly mature nature of the recommendations, the Assembly may wish to consider whether the same level of assurance could be maintained in a more cost-effective way. While I remain in favour of retaining the additional business performance audit as an important transparency and accountability tool, there may be scope to conduct the financial audit annually, while undertaking the business performance audit on a biennial basis or through targeted reviews of selected areas in alternate years. This could reduce audit-related costs while preserving the Assembly's commitment to sound financial management and external oversight.

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We have always sought to meet and indeed exceed expectations for oversight. Formal independent audits are only a small part of the oversight that the Secretariat seeks to satisfy. **The most important oversight for the Secretariat comes from the Assembly's Members and leadership.** In addition to my regular formal reporting to Assembly meetings, I always welcome questions and input from Members. It remains a source of pride that the vast majority of the comments I receive are in praise of Secretariat staff who work tirelessly to support Assembly work.

Conclusion


In the Secretariat we seek to set a framework for dialogue among Members and enable exchanges that contribute to our collective security. The extraordinary and increasing enthusiasm and engagement by parliamentarians in OSCE PA work is a clear indication that the organization is performing well and is delivering on this expectation.

I do not know what the security challenges of tomorrow will be. But I have every confidence that the OSCE Parliamentary Assembly will address these challenges in the same direct, political manner that it has in the past. Our response to **terrorism** following the 11 September 2001 attacks, our high-level engagement on the **financial crisis** in 2008, our full-throated condemnation of **Russian aggression against Ukraine** in 2014 and 2022, as well as our flexible responses to the **COVID pandemic** all give hope that the OSCE PA will deliver excellent results for our parliamentarians and populace. I thank all of the hundreds of parliamentarians that have contributed to make the OSCE PA such a dynamic forum this past year. And I particularly thank my colleagues in the Secretariat team that consistently deliver high quality results that respond to the needs of the Assembly and our collective security.
